re: Peel Watershed Land Use Planning

Please accept this letter as a written submission to the Peel Watershed Planning Commission for inclusion in the planning process.

37999 Yukon Inc. is a Yukon based company that owns mineral claims in the Peel Watershed Planning area (Curie claims on Illtyd Creek). The mineral claims were acquired in 2005 to cover an area that has had extensive exploration performed in the 1970s and 1980s. During that time at least \$0.5 million had been spent on exploration on the property.

In 2005, 37999, through its joint venture partner completed an additional \$350,000 of exploration and claim staking activity. In 2006, the partnership is planning to spend up to an additional \$1M on exploration in the area. This is a significant investment in the territory. I am aware that other mineral exploration companies that are also planning to be active with very significant expenditures on exploration.


The work in 2006 will require screening by YESAA and will be regulated by the Mining Land Use Regulations of the Quartz Mining Act (QMA). If a mine were to develop in the area it would require screening by YESAA, a Mine Permit from the Department of Energy Mines and Resources and a Water Permit from the Yukon Water Board. Any future mine development would also be subject to the Canadian Mine Effluent Regulations, the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, the Fisheries Act, the Wildlife Act, the Workers Compensation Act and other pertinent legislation and regulations. The development will also be subject to inspection by the territorial mines

inspectors and First Nations Resources officers in their respective Traditional Territories. These screenings, rules, regulations and inspections are all new since the mid 1990's and are designed to ensure responsible development, to protect the environment and to safeguard the area for future use.

We truly believe in the mineral potential of this portion of Yukon. There are a number of large mineral deposits in the area that I am sure you are aware of. Any future developments in this area will require road access. We believe it is imperative that land been made available for future road access and that as much land as possible be made available for mineral exploration.

We believe that other uses such as hunting, trapping, fishing and tourism can co-exist in this area, as it does elsewhere and as it has in the past. Mineral, oil, gas, and coal exploration and development will be significant for the future economic wealth of this area.
